

DSWD DROMIC Report #2 on the Effects of Tropical Cyclone “Luis” as of 02 August 2026, 6PM

I. Situation Overview

Issued at 05:00 pm, 02 August 2026, **Tropical Depression (TD) "Luis"** continues to move northwestward over the Philippine Sea east of Aurora.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Heavy Rainfall Outlook Refer to Weather Advisory No. 4 issued at 5:00 PM today for the heavy rainfall outlook due to Tropical Cyclone (TC) Luis and the Southwest Monsoon.

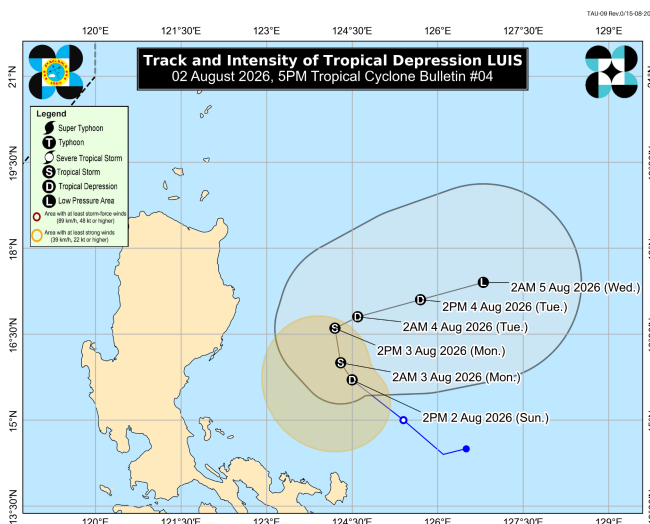
Severe Winds

- The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.
- The possibility of hoisting Wind Signal No. 2 is not ruled out.
- The Southwest Monsoon and the periphery of Luis will bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):
- Today (02 August): Marinduque, Occidental Mindoro, Oriental Mindoro, Romblon, Masbate, Sorsogon, Caluya Islands, Northern Samar, Samar, Biliran, Siquijor, Southern Leyte, Camiguin, and Dinagat Islands.
- Tomorrow (03 August) and Tuesday (04 August): Most of Luzon and Visayas, Lanao del Norte, Misamis Occidental, Camiguin, Surigao del Norte, Dinagat Islands, Sarangani, Davao Occidental, and Davao Oriental.

24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Up to moderate to rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 2.5 m: The eastern seaboard of Davao Oriental.
- Up to 2.0 m: The seaboard of Isabela, Surigao del Sur, and Davao Occidental; the eastern seaboard of Cagayan, Catanduanes, and Northern Samar; the northern seaboard of Aurora, Camarines Norte, Camarines Sur, and Catanduanes; the



remaining seaboard of Davao Oriental.

- Mariners of motorbancas and similarly sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.
- Other coastal waters have forecast wave heights of less than 2.0 m.

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

- It must be emphasized that heavy rainfall and severe winds may still be experienced in localities outside the landfall point and the forecast confidence cone. Refer to “Other Hazards affecting Land Areas” for more details. Furthermore, the track may still shift within the limit of the forecast confidence cone.
- Luis will continue to move generally northwestward in the next 12 hours before turning east northeastward for the remainder of the forecast period. Based on the latest forecast track, the center of Luis will remain over the Philippine Sea. However, a westward shift in the forecast track may result in landfall or close approach to Northern or Central Luzon.
- Luis is forecast to intensify into a tropical storm in the next 24 hours while moving over the sea east of Central Luzon. It will likely remain a tropical storm for only a short period. Afterwards, as Luis begins to turn generally east northeastward, a weakening trend is expected. It may be downgraded into a remnant low by Wednesday (05 August) before becoming fully assimilated into the circulation of Typhoon Dolphin.

The center of TD Luis was estimated based on all available data at 285 km East of Baler, Aurora (15.9 °N, 124.3 °E) and is moving Northwestward at 15 km/h with Maximum sustained winds of 55 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 70 km/h.

Issued on 30 July 2026 at 4:00 PM, cloudy skies with scattered rains and thunderstorms may have brought flash floods or landslides due to moderate to at times heavy rains due to the trough of a Low Pressure Area (LPA 05d) in Eastern Visayas, Northern Mindanao, Caraga, and Davao Region.

On the same day, a trough of LPA brought continuous heavy rainfall which caused flash floods in Zamboanga City. In response, the City Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office (CDRRMO) of Zamboanga City immediately conducted rescue operations throughout the entire area.

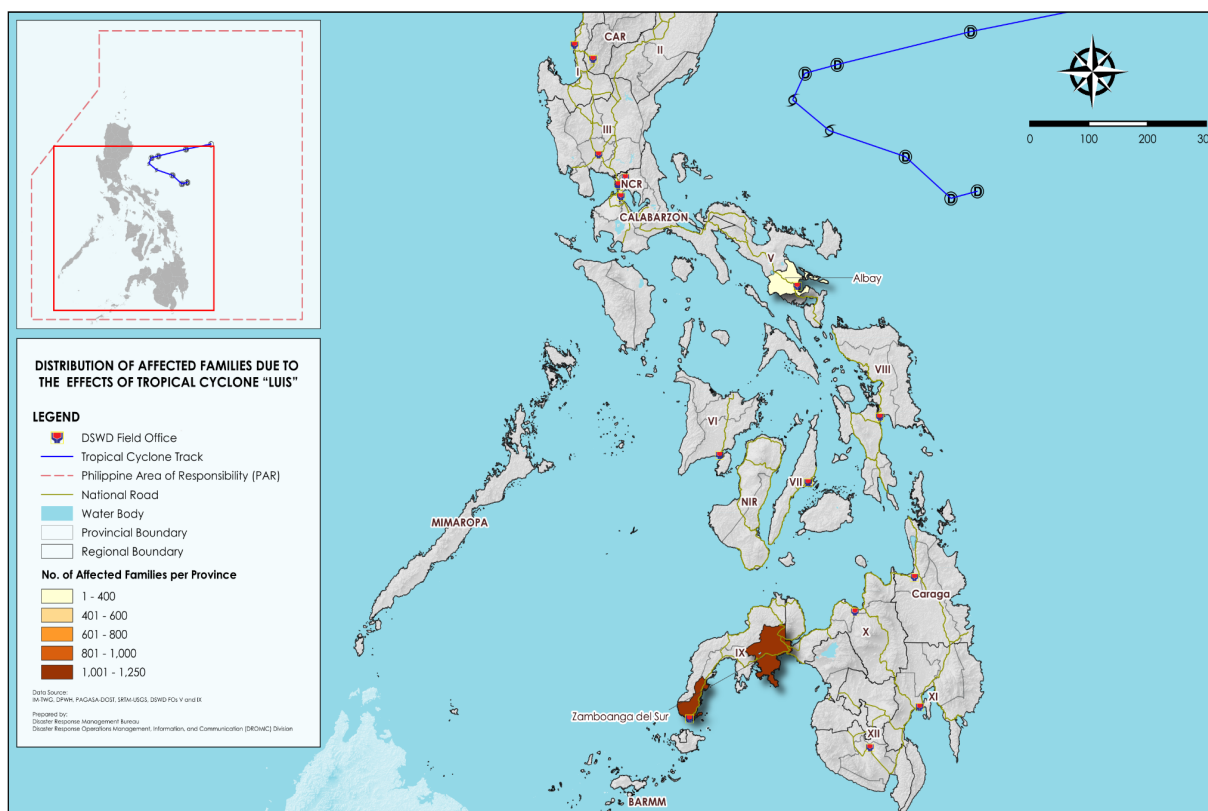
In response, the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), through its Field Offices (FOs) V and IX, are in close coordination with the affected Local Government Units (LGUs), to monitor the situation and ensure the provision of necessary assistance to the affected population.

Meanwhile, the DSWD FOs V and IX have already provided relief assistance to address the immediate needs of the affected families and individuals.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **1,586 families** or **4,056 persons** are affected in **Regions V and IX** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **1,212 families** or **3,682 persons** currently taking temporary shelter at **Curuan Evacuation Center** in **Zamboanga City** (see Annex B).

IV. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱1,162,702.15** worth of assistance was provided by **DSWD** to the affected families (see Annex C).
